Kevin Matthew Wong is Hakka Chinese-Canadian artist, internationally touring theatre creator, producer, and video & installation artist.

As a Hakka artist (客家) he is interested creating work about guesthood and cultural preservation. As the Director of Producing at Why Not Theatre he leads large-scale and internationally touring works, like the critically acclaimed Mahabharata, currently at Canadian Stage. He has collaborated across a diverse set of projects and companies in Canada, the UK, Spain, Germany, Australia, Korea, and the United States. Kevin is the inaugural Jini Stolk Creative Fellow, researching how legacy institutions can authentically collaborate with BIPOC artists and companies.

About Broadleaf Creative

Broadleaf Creative creates fun, accessible, and contemporary artworks about little-known and urgent topics.

Founded in 2014, Broadleaf Creative creates and tours multidisciplinary art works, films and performances based on local, national and global issues. They offer dramaturgy and artistic consultation for socially engaged artists and projects. In 2024, Broadleaf Creative became the inaugural recipient of Toronto's Dora Mavor Moore Awards' "Innovative Experience Award".

About the Play

Synopsis

Like many Canadians, Kevin's always wondered about his roots. Kevin is Hakka (客家)...he thinks.

Out of the blue, he gets a phone call asking him to write a play about Hakka identity. For seniors. In Markham.

From creator and performer Kevin Matthew Wong (The Chemical Valley Project) comes a charming and intimate story that transforms into a layered Chinese-Canadian tale spanning continents, migrations, and generations.

Creator's Note

One day while I was working on the script for Benevolence, my father looked over my shoulder and asked, "Kevin, why's this Hakka stuff so interesting to you?" It was a revealing question. It struck me how within cultural diasporas, some generations feel more access to their sense of identity than others. For Hakka, a group known in Chinese as "guest families" and as China's nomadic people — our two thousand years of migration probably exacerbates those generational gulfs.

Growing up, I had a ready answer whenever I was asked about my heritage: "I'm Chinese-Canadian." Simple. But a few years ago, that confidence wavered as I began coming to terms with how little I actually understood about "being Hakka," especially when speaking with elders. If I knew anything about "Hakka-ness" it was the joyful, lengthy, and often mysterious conversations my grandmother would have in the Hakka language, on the telephone with loved ones near and far. This play tries to channel a similar kind of unapologetic joy, and it hopes to interrogate some of that mystery too.

I chose to create Benevolence because I had a conviction that my experience was similar to that of many Canadians. Many of us are comfortable declaring who we are — the simple version— but struggle when we consider the question more deeply. I hope that sharing part of my journey of self-discovery resonates with your own questions about identity and being here in Canada. I hope also that the benevolence at the heart of this story finds its way into yours.
