She previously worked as a stage manager for 10 years, before turning her hand to playwrighting. Encouraged by a friend, tucker green submitted the unproduced She Three for the Alfred Fagon Award. It didn't win, but it brought her to the attention of the Royal Court. Since then, she has gone on to write many notable works, with her play born bad winning her the 2004 Olivier Award for Most Promising Playwright. Her plays include, two women (Soho theatre), dirty butterfly (Soho Theatre), born bad (Hampstead Theatre), trade (the Other Place), stoning mary (Royal Court), generations (National Theatre), random (Royal Court), laws of war (Royal Court), truth and reconciliation (Royal Court), nut (National Theatre, Shed), hang.
